Benefit to Being a Therapy Dog

It is a commonly accepted fact that there is great benefit to humans from petting and interacting with a therapy dog. It lowers blood pressure and decreases stress levels. Master's student Zenithson Ng has partnered with Dr. Otto to look at the other side of the equation and explore the effects on therapy dogs themselves. Their goal is to identify the physiological responses the

dogs have from their therapy work..

There are some groups who believe that the use of therapeutic dogs is immoral and unkind to the dog. This study will explore the effects of petting on the dog's cortisol level as well as their response to a behavioral analysis and a chronic stress test. 16 dogs will participate in the study along with 40 volunteers.

Saliva samples will be collected every 30 minutes during the therapy session.

Dogs will be walked by their owner for 30 minutes, followed by an hour of petting from volunteers, and ending with another 30 minute walk.

The information gained from this study will be used to create protocols for using therapy dogs.

Q & A

Dear Dr. Otto: I have seen your fitness videos on Facebook and noticed you have not recommended the use of a treadmill?

-Trainer

Dear Trainer:

The videos you have seen on [Facebook](https://www.facebook.com/pennvetworkingdogcenter) have primarily focused on stretching, strength and proprioception. When it comes to conditioning, the challenge is that it takes a

lot more distance and speed to condition a dog than the average trainer can supply on foot. A treadmill can be a valuable tool, especially when the weather is bad, but there are a few serious issues that need to be addressed.

#1-The average treadmill's belt is too short to allow a dog to correctly stride w/o injury. Look for a runner's treadmill with an extra long belt 60"+.

#2-Too much, too fast. It is easy to pop your dog on a treadmill and push start. Make sure they are properly trained to run on the treadmill and that you build them up slowly increasing speed and incline over time. (Crate to 5K for dogs!) Also consider using a bike. This is an excellent and safe tool and provides both dog and handler fitness.

Special Honor for Dr. Otto

On March 13th Dr. Otto received an unexpected surprise. Upon opening the package she found an American flag and a declaration stating that on January 1, 2012, the enclosed flag was flown over Afghanistan by US troops “in support of missions utilizing military working dogs, in honor of you and your colleagues.”

Due to her experience with working dogs and expertise in critical care, Dr. Otto has been

serving on an advisory group dedicated to the care of special operations military dogs.

This group focuses on creating guidelines for addressing the variety of injuries and illness that dogs serving on the front lines might encounter.

In addition to her work with Military Dogs, Dr. Otto has also been devoting her work to the benefit of other detection dogs including Search & Res-

cue.

Including deploying to the World Trade Center, she is the director of the Penn Vet Working Dog Center.

The flag was a special and unexpected honor and will be hung for display at the Working Dog Center building opening this fall.

ACVO/Merial National Service Dog Eye Exam

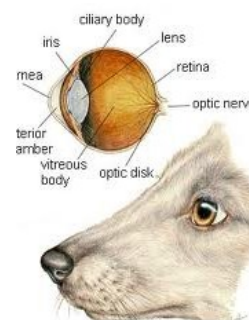
For the month of May 2012, the American College of Veterinary Ophthalmologists (ACVO) is launching the 5th annual ACVO/Merial National Service Dog Eye Exam Event to help service animals who dedicate their lives to serving the public. More than 200 board certified veterinary ophthalmologists throughout the U.S., as well as Canada and Puerto Rico, are estimated to provide free sight-saving eye exams to thousands of eligible service animals. During the complete ocular

exam, the veterinary specialists look for problems including: redness, squinting, cloudy corneas, retinal disease, early cataracts, and other serious abnormalities. To qualify, animals must be "active working animals" that were certified by a formal training program or organization or currently enrolled in a formal training program. Owners/agents for the animal must FIRST register the animal via an online registration form beginning April 1, 2012 at www.ACVOeyeexam.org.

Registration ends April 30th.

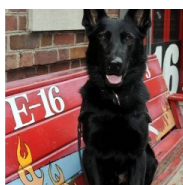

Hero Dog Awards: Voting Begins April 1st

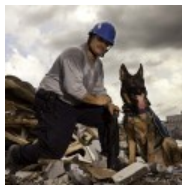
